Rosalind Franklin



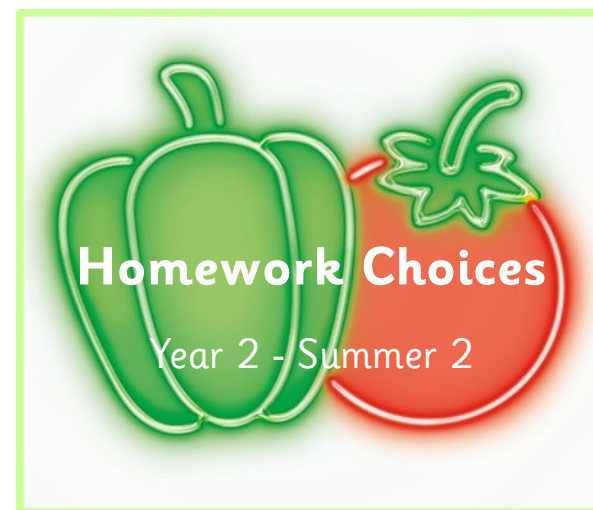
Task 7: Practise your throwing and catching skills !

Task 4: Flesh Eating Plant!

A new type of plant has been discovered and it can eat humans! You have a choice of tasks about this plant.

1. Write a newspaper article or diary about how it was discovered and an incident which has happened with this new species.
2. Write instructions about how to look after a flesh eating plant. What will you need? How will you care for it? What do you need to be careful of?



Task 5: Time revision.

Build Your Own Clock

You will need:

- 2 paper plates or 2 circular pieces of card
- Some spare card
- Pen
- Scissors
- Split pin or blu tack
- Glue



Instructions

1. Take the two paper plates and split the edge into twelve even sections.
2. On one paper plate write the numbers from 1 - 12 in the 12 sections you made. Make sure you look at a clock to ensure they are in the correct place. Cut the line between each section.
3. On the other plate in the section at the top write o'clock, then following round clockwise write 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30. You should then be at the bottom. Keep going round and this time go backwards, 25, 20, 15, 10, 5. You should now have filled in all the sections. (What do you notice about all the numbers you have written?)
4. Put the circle with the numbers 1-12 on top of the second circle, making sure the section that says o'clock is underneath the number 12 and glue them together in the middle making sure you don't glue over the numbers you have written.
5. Take the extra card and make two hands, these are usually in the shape of an arrow. One is always longer than the other. Label the longer hand - minutes and the shorter hand - hour
6. Use a split pin or blu tack to attach the hands to the centre of the clock. You should be able to spin or move them around.

The numbers on the top tell you the hour.

The numbers you will see when you peel back the top numbers tell you the minutes.

If you split your clock in half from 12 to 6 - the minutes numbers increase as you travel past 12 to the 6 this is telling you how many minutes past the hour. As the minutes numbers decrease from 6 - 12 these are telling you the minutes to the next hour!
