

Annual SEN Report 2021-22

<u>Context</u>

- Regent Farm First School is a large first school catering for children from Nursery to Year 4.
- The school also has an ARP catering for visually impaired children, supporting them in mainstream school.
- In the academic year from 2021-22 we had 331 children on the school register.
- There were 4 children in the ARP.
- We are 2 form entry throughout.
- Our numbers of children on School Support were higher than the national average.
- Our numbers of EHCPs were in line with the national average.

SEN Population

Numbers of children with SEN:

In 2021-22 there were 70 children on the SEN register. This was 17% of the school population compared to 14.7% nationally.

SEND Data 21-22

Reading:

- 63.3% of SEN children achieved the expected standard or above compared to 91.9% of non-SEN children.
- 60.8% of SEN children made the expected progress or higher compared to 89.4% of non-SEN children.

<u>Writing</u>

- 48.9% of SEN children achieved the expected standard or above compared to 89.1% of non-SEN children.
- 47.1% of SEN children made the expected progress or higher compared to 86.8% of non-SEN children.

<u>Maths</u>

- <u>71.5% of SEN children achieved the expected standard or above</u> compared to 92.4% of non-SEN children.
- 68.6% of SEN children made the expected progress or higher compared to 89.9% of non-SEN children.
